David's sin with Bathsheba 2 Sam 11-12 "The transmigration of souls" is the belief that the soul is reborn in one or more successive mortal bodies; a form of reincarnation. A tenet of Asian religions such as Buddhism but does not include animals or non-human forms.

In the Kabbalistic school of interpretation, each Jewish soul is reincarnated enough times in order to fulfill each of the 613 laws of the Torah.

- Sin will take you further than you want to go.
- Sin will keep you longer than you want to stay.
- Sin will take more from you than you are willing to give.

- Betrayal Insurrection Absalom and Adonijah (14:1-15:2, I Kings 1:1-13) * vs 5-6
- Revolt Sheba (19-20)
- War, famine, pestilence (21:1-24:25).

Consequences *David never disciplined Adonijah or questioned his behavior.

How was David a Man after God's own Heart? Ps 27

- 1. Believed in God (Ps 27:1-3, Heb 11:6).
- 2. Longed for God (Ps 27:1-3, Phil 1:21-24).
- 3. Praised God (Ps 27:6, Eph 1:6, 12, 14).
- 4. Relied on God (Ps 27:7-10).
- 5. Listened to God (Ps 27:7-10). We must hear and obey the Lord to be His (John 14:15).
