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## SELECTING THE PATH...

Lawrence Berra, better known as Yogi Berra, the long time catcher for the New York Yankees is quoted as having said, "when you come to a fork in the road, take it." Then again he also noted, "no matter where you go,

there you are." Granted he may not have been as succinct as others, but he did cause one to give pause and ponder. Sitting back and reflecting, it may trigger a thought about something Robert Frost wrote in his poem "The Road Less Traveled". Two paths are presented (a fork in the road), both look inviting, but doubting he would ever return to this spot again, he must make a decision. The poem concludes the follow-

ing, "Two roads diverged in a wood, and I-I took the one less traveled by, and that has made all the difference."

As Jesus drew near the end of the Sermon on the Mount, He made a like comparison. In verse fourteen of Matthew the seventh chapter, He set forth the "Golden Rule" and quickly sets forth the following. "Enter by the narrow gate; for the gate is wide, and the way is broad that leads to destruction, and many are those who enter by it. For the gate is small, and the way is narrow that leads to life, and few are those who find it." (vs 13-14) A crossroads. The proverbial fork in the road.

As we journey through life, there will be any number of paths/roads presented before us. Choices will have to be made as to which path to follow. Many will appear promising and oh, so attractive. But there is but one that harmonizes with what our Creator would have us to do. Notice what is seen in Jeremiah the sixth chapter and verse sixteen. "Thus says the Lord; 'Stand in the ways and see, and ask for the old paths, where the good way is, and walk in it; then you will find rest for your souls. But they said, we will not walk in it." The blatant refusal to travel along the

good path defies logic. Yet so many then and well opt to embrace the pathway that as Jesus noted is "wide" and "broad" and leads to destruction as opposed to the narrow pathway that leads to life.

In essence the "road less traveled", is one that eschews the crowd and embraces a life of devotion and obedience to Jesus who is the Christ; He is the way. "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through Me." (John 14:6) The only pathway that leads to the Father is the pathway that Jesus blazed for His followers. "Fixing our eves on Jesus, the

author and perfecter of faith, who for the joy set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and has sat down at the right hand of the throne of God." (Hebrews 12:2)

The path we choose in life is pivotal. Following as it were a spiritual GPS as found in God's word. Notice the following passages the first from Psalms 16:11. "Thou wilt make known to me the path of life; in Thy presence is fulness of joy; in Thy right hand there are pleasures forever." Solomon writes in Proverbs chapter three and verses five and six, "Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge Him, and He will make your paths straight." "Thy word is a lamp to my feet, and a light to my path." (Psalms 119:105)

It takes courage to follow the narrow way, however it is the only one that leads to life. For it alone shows us the way to the Tree of Life. "I will instruct you and teach you in the way which you should go; I will counsel you with My eye upon you." (Psalms 32:8) "Blessed are those who wash their robes, that they may have the right to the tree of life, and may enter by the gates into the city." (Revelation 22:14) Praise God for the path that leads to life. (wbe)

ROMANS 13 v. THE UNITED STATES, CONT.

Not wanting to think the worse of our governmental leaders, perhaps they were well intended in looking out for the welfare of those attending a religious service. Regardless that does not give them carte blanche to violate a basic Constitutional right nor fly in the face of a basic human right. By so doing there is the "law of unintended consequences" that comes into play. For by their actions they are, as the perception may well be that they are impeding those who seeking to serve God. In essence fighting against the God of Heaven. It is somewhat like what is found in the book of Isaiah. "Now go, write it on a tablet before them and inscribe it on a scroll, that it may serve in the time to come as a witness forever. For this is a rebellious people, false sons, sons who refuse to listen to the instruction of the Lord; who says to the seers, 'You must not see visions'; and to the prophets, 'You must not prophecy to us what is right, speak to us pleasant words, prophesy illusions. Get out of the way; turn aside from the path, let us hear no more about the Holy One of Israel." (Isaiah 30:9-11)

As children of God we are faced with a dilemma. Clearly we have been directed to obey the laws of the land, as seen in Romans 13. Notice verse five of Romans 13, which states the following. "Wherefore, it is necessary to be in subjection, not only because of wrath but also for conscience sake." What happens when "conscience sake" is divided? Jesus, when He came in the form of man and walked on the earth, He was subject to the laws of the land. He paid taxes and observed the laws. Yet, He was consumed by zeal and drove the moneychangers out the temple. Not once, but twice as recorded in John 2:14-18 and Mark 11:15-18. He did not sin.

Peter and John, when told they were not to "speak or teach at all in the name of Jesus" (see Acts 4:18), their response was succinct, "Whether it is right in the sight of God to listen to you more than to God, you judge. For we cannot but speak the things which we have seen and heard." In the fifth chapter of Acts, it is reported back to the Council that the apostles were teaching and preaching in the name of Jesus in spite of the directive they had been told. They were brought before the Council where the high priest said to them, "We gave you strict orders not to continue teaching in this name, and behold, you have filled Jerusalem with your teaching, and intend to bring this man's blood upon us." (v. 28) Without hesitation the apostles gave their response, "We must obey God rather than man." (v. 29)

Now getting back to the dilemma mentioned earlier. There is no denying that we have been told to be in subjection to the laws of the land, but we also have a command from God, "Not forsaking our own assembling together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the day drawing near." (Hebrews 10:24-25) To be sure there is the availability of livestream and zoom, but that can never replace congregating together with those of like precious faith. Which is precisely what God has directed. For whatever reason, people have a distorted sense of safety. There is a level of comfort going to the grocery store, gas station, restaurants, beauty parlors, barber shops, post office and of course the office of a doctor; but sadly for some not so much when it comes to assembling with the saints. The percentage of transmission of the virus traced back to churches is infinitesimal, not so with the other venues mentioned.


As the early stages of the pandemic raged last year and brought about the "lock down", many in the brotherhood expressed genuine concern about if once things leveled out would members return to worshipping in person. The realization has proven that concern was warranted. Across the country news of congregations suffering falling attendance and membership is common place. It is beyond heart breaking. The "lock down" imposed by the government should not have stopped any from assembling. Remember what the apostles stated as seen in Acts 5:29, "We must obey God rather than man." The governmental imposed "lock down" has served as a catalyst of sorts for rationalization on the part of individuals seeking a level of comfort and acceptability in opting for the "digital" instead of the personal. It is one thing to be absent because of illness or incapacity, but not because of "lock down", "mandate" or any other created element of man.

The founding fathers of the United States would be aghast that those in authority would even entertain the notion of forbidding citizens from assembling together to worship God. Consider the following from the Declaration of Independence, "all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness." Then factor in The First Amendment to the Constitution, ratified in 1791, provides that "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof." It is more than evident that the framers of this great country wanted to secure the freedom of all to worship and to assemble together for such purpose, unencumbered by the government or any other person or movement. Should we ever be faced with a like situation in the future where the government imposes anything that violates God's word, as christians we must respectfully oppose. We would in no way be in violation of Romans 13. (wbe)
