Take note of what pens in Romans chapter five, "while we were still helpless, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly." The author of Hebrews was striving to get those to whom he was writing to come and appreciate the value of Christ; and correspondingly to recognize their own worth and value. In chapter nine and verse fifteen, the author notes that Jesus is indeed the mediator of a new covenant and has with His blood provided to those "who have been called may receive the promise of eternal inheritance."
