The challenge set before the handful of men who shared a history of hard living, was to name something for which they were thankful in three seconds or less and they couldn't repeat what had already been said. Trying to be as inconspicuous as possible while watching from a short distance away, I could hear the rapid-fire responses. A tear formed in the corner of one of my eyes. Suffice to say these men were truly grateful on many different fronts. One thing was universal, that being each man had chosen to embrace an attitude of gratitude.

In Colossians 3:15 Paul reminds the brethren in Colossae that there exists a preciousness in the new relationship we have in Christ and with one another. Notice carefully how that verse is crafted. "And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in one body; and be thankful." Because you are joined with others in the body of Christ, be thankful. Be thankful that you matter and belong. Isn't that something that most long for?

Now look at Colossians 3:16, because of what is brought out in the previous verses Paul then points out, "Let the word of Christ richly dwell within you, with all wisdom teaching and admonishing one another with psalms and hymns and

spiritual songs, singing with thankfulness in your hearts to God." Note the emphasis of an attitude of gratitude; "in your hearts".

Now look slightly to your left and up, see the verse Colossians 3:17? Bear in mind that Paul wrote those words while under house arrest in Rome.
